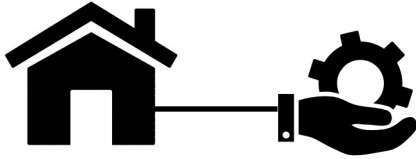


# HOUSING & SERVICE DELIVERY OPTIONS

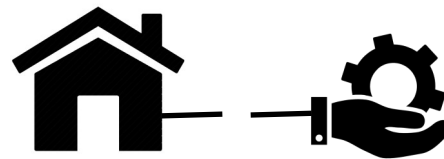
## PROVIDER-CONTROLLED (PC)

## HOUSING OPTIONS

Colorado residents with I/DD have diverse preferences in where and what type of housing they would like to live once they no longer want or are able to live with a parent/s or other family caregiver. The following are short descriptions of some of the housing options:

**CURRENT FAMILY HOME** — This describes a scenario when one’s parent or support “leaves the nest” and the individual stays in the home. This may be a great option for those who have spent resources in modifications of the home to be more accessible. It may also be a great option for those who have created strong connections with their current neighborhood.

**ACCESSORY DWELLING UNIT OR TINY HOME** — This is a more affordable option that can be added to the property of one’s family or supportive/paid neighbor, yet still provides the privacy of having one’s own home.

**SCATTERED-SITE** — Describes a typical apartment, townhome or single-family home. This home is “scattered” in a typical neighborhood and has no intentional cognitively-accessible design strategies or amenities.

**COHOUSING OR INTENTIONALLY-BUILT NEIGHBORHOOD** — Describes a multi-generational neighborhood that was created collaboratively with future residents having a shared vision and purpose. Residents rent or own their own homes in the community, and do not share personal finances. They choose to live in proximity to others in order to more casually share quality time and support one another.

**PLANNED COMMUNITY WITH BUILT-IN SUPPORTS** — Individuals with or without intellectual/developmental disabilities may rent or own units, but the property was developed with the neurodiverse population in mind. It may intentionally incorporate both physical and cognitively-accessible design elements as well as common spaces or amenities desired by future residents with I/DD. Additionally, the property may offer soft supports not otherwise covered by Medicaid.

## SERVICE DELIVERY OPTIONS

Long-term support services are individualized, day-to-day support for people with I/DD. Some service delivery models are only available in provider-controlled settings, but most are available in both provider-controlled settings and consumer-controlled settings.

**AGENCY-BASED ROTATIONAL STAFFING** — An agency recruits, hires, trains, schedules and fires support staff.

**SELF-DIRECTED SUPPORT** — An individual is given a budget based on an assessment of her/his/their support needs and they are responsible for recruiting, hiring, training, scheduling and firing support staff. This may include family members.

**SHARED LIVING** — The person with I/DD invites a person or family to live in her/his/their home to provide services.

**HOST HOME** — A service provider invites an individual with I/DD to live and be supported by them in the providers home.

**REMOTE SUPPORT** — Uses technology such as video conferencing, smart-home devices and other assistive technology to support an individual.

**INTERMEDIATE CARE FACILITIES FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH INTELLECTUAL DISABILITY (ICF/ID)** — ICF/IDs are provider-controlled settings that provide both housing and individualized health care to individuals in need of active treatment services.

**RESIDENTIAL TRANSITION PROGRAM** — A temporary program with the goal of teaching life skills for persons with I/DD to live independently in the future.

**PAID NEIGHBOR** — A person who lives nearby and can offer support on a scheduled or on-call basis.
